Liturgical Message


In Luke 19:1-10, we read about Zacchaeus, a tax collector who climbed a sycamore tree to see Jesus. Though he was a man of wealth and status, his heart was restless, seeking something more significant than worldly riches. Jesus, seeing his faith and desire for change, called Zacchaeus down and went to his house, showing that salvation is for all who sincerely repent. This encounter reminds us that Christ does not look at our past sins but our willingness to turn toward Him.


Zacchaeus' response to Jesus was one of immediate repentance and action. He promised to give half his wealth to the poor and restore fourfold to anyone he had wronged. His transformation was not just a private feeling but a visible, concrete change in his life. This teaches us that true repentance is not just saying sorry but turning away from sin and striving to live in righteousness. Christ's words, "Today salvation has come to this house," affirm that God welcomes and restores those who come to Him with a sincere heart.

The story of Zacchaeus is a message of hope and encouragement. No one is beyond God's mercy, no matter how lost they may seem. Jesus came "to seek and to save the lost," reminding us that our faith should be active. We should seek Christ just as Zacchaeus did.
